12 Years & Under Golf Championships

RULES AND GUIDELINES

Section A – Championship Overview

- A - 1.** These Rules and Guidelines should be read in conjunction with School Sport Australia Policies, Championship Protocols and the Sport Championship Organisational Manual.
- A - 2.** The Championships shall be conducted in accordance with the rules as laid down by *The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland* and the (R&A) and *United States Golf Association (USGA)* unless otherwise stated.
- A - 3.** The Championships shall be conducted in accordance with a current Memorandum of Understanding between School Sport Australia and Golf Australia.

A - 4. Championship Length

The Championship shall be a five (5) day event with the format defined in item B - 1.

A - 5. Eligibility

- A - 5.1** All students must be 12 years of age and under on 31 December of the year of competition unless age dispensation has been granted as per rule A - 6.
- A - 5.2** Must possess a golf Handicap which is recognised by Golf Australia.
- A - 5.3** Written evidence and a Golflink number verifying a current handicap should be forwarded to the National Golf Advisor and the Host Body at least six (6) weeks before the Championships. Any handicap changes should be tabled at the Pre Championship meeting.

A - 6. Age Dispensation

Age Dispensation may be granted to a State or Territory for these Championships as allowed through the School Sport Australia Sport Participation Policy.

A - 7. Team Size

- A - 7.1** A team will consist of twelve (12) players, eight (8) boys and four (4) girls.
- A - 7.2** Each member body may enter a team with a minimum number of six (6) boys and three (3) girls.

A - 8. Attendance at Championships

All students who participate in the School Sport Australia Golf Championships must remain at the Championship location throughout the duration of the Championships and be bound by all Championship arrangements, except in exceptional circumstances as per School Sport Australia policy.

Section B – Competition Structure

B - 1. Championship Format

B - 1.1 Where possible the championship format should be as follows:

- Day 1 – Sunday - Teams arrive – practice day, Pre-Championship meeting
- Day 2 – Monday – 4 Person Ambrose – separate Girl’s and Boy’s competition Two boy’s teams and one girl’s team per member body
- Day 3 – Tuesday – 18 Hole Strokeplay - Individual Stroke Team Event
- Day 4 – Wednesday - Educational Excursion, Post Championship Meeting.
- Day 5 – Thursday – 18 Hole Strokeplay - Individual Stroke Team Event – Presentation Lunch

B - 1.2 Where possible an AM start is preferable on all days.

B - 1.3 Pace of Play - To assist in the pace of play – a shot gun start is the preferred start format for all days/formats.

B - 1.4 Adverse Playing Conditions – All Events

B - 1.4.1 Play will continue under any weather conditions, except as follows:

B - 1.4.1.1 The Club in question declares its course unplayable; or

B - 1.4.1.2 A suspension of play is declared by the Tournament Convener appointed by the host member body.

B - 1.4.1.3 In the event of B - 1.4.1.1 or B - 1.4.1.2 above, the Tournament Convener of the host Member body in consultation with the National Golf Advisor shall, without delay, convene a meeting of Team Managers, to determine what action will be taken to decide the winners of the event.

B - 2. Draw

B - 2.1 Draws for (i) teams in the Ambrose Event and (ii) groupings in the Stroke Event are to be conducted by the host member body and should be included in the Program.

B - 2.2 Individual students should play with different students on each day of the Craig Parry Shield. A combination of handicaps should be evenly dispersed through all groups. The intent is to have a mix of handicaps in each group and players from each State and Territory.

B - 3. Duration of matches

All daily events in the Championships will be of 18 holes.

B - 4. Championship Protocols / Specific Rules / Results

B - 4.1 Conditions of Play

B - 4.1.1 No ride-on motorised carts, caddies or bag-pullers will be permitted unless dispensation is given by School Sport Australia. An appropriate person may need to be provided to drive the cart. Under no circumstances are cart drivers allowed to act in the role of a caddy. Motorised pull buggies are permitted.

B - 4.1.1.1 Managers are to set a responsible example with the appropriate use of motorised carts, abiding by the safe use of these vehicles i.e. two (2) people per buggy.

B - 4.1.1.2 Students are not to be in charge of motorised carts at any time during the Championship.

B - 4.1.2 Mobile phones and other electronic devices must be turned off or on silent mode on the course during competition.

B - 4.1.3 Spectators, Parents and Team Managers are not allowed to coach or offer advice either verbally or by gesture to competitors during their round.

B - 4.1.4 Parents and spectators are required to stay 30m in front of groups and to the side of the fairway. If this rule is breached the offenders will face the following consequences;

- a) On the first breach they will be given a warning. A State Team Manager or any official can give this warning. The relevant State Team Manager and Championship Officials need to be informed immediately
- b) A second breach will incur a two shot penalty for the relevant player – this can be imposed by a State Team Manager or any official. The relevant State Team Manager and Championship Officials need to be informed immediately
- c) A third breach will result in the offending parent/spectator being asked to leave the course. The NSA or Championship Official can impose this final warning. If the offending parent/spectator refuses to leave the course, the player will be disqualified and must leave the course.

B - 4.1.5 Spectators, for the benefit of students should refrain from smoking and the drinking of alcohol in the vicinity of Championship golfers.

School Sport operates under 'smoke free' guidelines plus no alcohol is allowed at SSA Championships.

B - 4.1.6 Once competition starts, on course practice is not allowed on all championship venues. Breach of this rule will result in scores from that venue not counting for the relevant players.

B - 4.1.7 Each playing group should be accompanied by an adult 'walker', whose purpose is to monitor scores and control parental influences.

B - 4.1.8 Distance measuring devices are permitted (without slope function) in all competitions.

B - 4.2 Ambrose Competition

B - 4.2.1 Teams of 4 Boys or 4 Girls in separate events

B - 4.2.2 The eight (8) boys from each State / Territory will be seeded into two teams. The Ambrose teams will be seeded for boys - (seeded teams for boys 1,4,5,8 and 2,3,6,7) in handicap order from the eight players. Team 1 will be the team with the number 1 player. If both teams have equal handicap Team 1 will be the team with the lowest team handicap.

B - 4.2.3 Ambrose member body teams should play on consecutive holes. This allows managers to watch all groups more easily.

B - 4.2.4 It is normal practice in Ambrose competition for the highest handicapped player to hit first, the second highest handicapped player will be next and so on with the highest marker playing last.

B - 4.2.5 Rules

B - 4.2.5.1 All traditional rules of golf and Ambrose format apply.

B - 4.2.5.2 Each player must use a minimum of 3 tee shots during the round.

B - 4.2.5.3 Through the green: Once selected, the ball is marked players may place ball within one club length of marker (no closer the hole).

B - 4.2.5.4 Green: Once selected, the ball is marked player may place ball within one putter head of marker (no closer the hole). No tap ins.

B - 4.2.6 Cards

Each player should record their own card as an educational experience and submit it to their manager as a practice card. The Official with each group should keep the official score card.

B - 4.3 Strokeplay

The Strokeplay is a 36 hole team event played over two days. There are Gross (The Craig Parry Championship) and Nett (Brenda Carnavas Shield for girls and Bowtell / Abbott Shield for boys) team prizes with the Gross event being of more importance. Teams may win only one prize in each of the competitions.

B - 5. Method of Determining a Winner

B - 5.1 Ambrose

B - 5.1.1 Teams with the lowest score will be declared the winners.

B - 5.1.2 If teams are equal, a countback will be used to decide the winners using last 9, last 6, last 3, hole by hole.

B - 5.1.3 If teams are still equal, joint winners will be declared.

B - 5.1.4 The countback will be used for Gross and Nett.

B -5.1 added December 2020

B - 5.2 Strokeplay

B - 5.2.1 Brenda Carnavas Shield – Girls Team Nett Championships

The winning team will be the team with the least aggregate of each team's best 3 Nett scores from round 1 and the best 3 Nett scores from round 2.

B - 5.2.2 Bowtell / Abbott Shield – Boys Team Nett Championship

The winning team will be the team with the least aggregate of each team's best 6 Nett scores from round 1 and the best 6 Nett scores from round 2.

B - 5.2.3 In the event of a tie in the team 36 Hole Stroke Event joint winners / placings will be declared.

B - 5.2.4 Teams Stroke Play – Craig Parry Shield

The winning team will be the team with the least aggregate of each boy's team's best 6 Gross scores from round 1 and the best 6 Gross scores from round 2. This is added to the aggregate of each girl's team's best 3 Gross scores from round 1 and the best 3 Gross scores from round 2.

B - 5.2.5 In the situation that scores are equal joint winners / placings will be declared.

B - 5.3 Relative Importance of the Stroke and Handicap Events

At the School Sport Australia Championship first and second places (third if the numbers warrant) in the team Stroke Championship are the premier positions, then followed by the Handicap winners. This should be reflected in terms of trophy values.

Section C – Facilities / Equipment

C - 1. To host the SSA 12 Years and Under Golf Championships the hosting body must have access to a Golf Club/s with the following facilities:

- Suitably challenging courses set up appropriately for 12 Years and Under players
- Practice facilities
- Buggies (40-60)
- Carts for officials
- Golfink compatible scoring system and score display facilities in clubhouse
- Catering
- Presentation area

Section D – Uniform

D - 1. Students shall compete in member body team uniforms.

Section E – Injury Management

Refer to School Sport Australia Championship Protocols and Policy for the management of injuries. This policy will override any sport specific injury management Protocols.

Section F – Officials

F - 1. Tournament Convener

It is the responsibility of the host body to provide a suitable Tournament Convener for the Championship. The Convener must have significant experience as a player/administrator in golf.

F - 2. Referees

It is the responsibility of the host member body to provide suitably qualified Referee(s) for the Championship.

Section G – Protests

G - 1. Any protests must be submitted in writing to the National Golf Advisor / Host Body Representative within 1 hour of the conclusion of that day's play. The judiciary shall meet at a suitable time on that day to deliberate on the issue. The decision will be conveyed to the Team Managers before the next day's play commences.

Section H – Tribunal / Judiciary

H - 1. The Judiciary should consist of the National Golf Advisor (or Tournament Convener in their absence) and all selected member body delegates except from the member body that is involved in the dispute.

Section I – Trophies / Awards / Medals

I - 1. Ambrose Competition Prizes are to be awarded for:

I - 1.1 Winners Boys: Gross & Nett

I - 1.2 Winners Girls: Gross & Nett

I - 1.3 No member body team should win both Gross & Nett in the same event (Gross shall take precedence)

I - 2. Medals are to be presented to members and officials of the teams as per the table below.

I - 3. Trophies

I - 3.1 The perpetual Craig Parry Champions trophy is presented to the winners of the Teams Stroke competition.

I - 3.2 The perpetual Bowtell / Abbott Shield is presented to the winners of the Boys Teams Nett – Championships.

I - 3.3 The perpetual Brenda Carnavas Shield is presented to the winners of the Girls Teams Nett – Championships.

I - 3.4 The winners and runners up of the Ambrose Boys and Girls Gross competition and the Boys and Girls Nett competition are presented with prizes arranged by the School Sport Australia office. The cost of the prizes is to be included in the Championship Levy.

I - 4. Memento

The School Sport Australia office organises a memento ball marker with the School Sport Australia logo, venue and year. The cost of the memento ball markers is to be included in the Championship Levy.
